"Some of these officials also worked

with another senior state police officer who too is under the radar of the state government," said an official.

Recently, bookies Sonu Jalan and

Ketan Tann had made allegations of extortion against Kothmire, Singh and retired 'encounter specialist' Pradeep Sharma in an alleged fake betting case. "The state government is already

probing two cases against Singh after he made allegations of Rs 100-crore extortion on former Home Minister Anil Deshmukh. The allegations are being investigated by the CBI. The state government appears to be sending a clear message that things won't be taken lightly," said an official.



To increase air circulation, reorganise your fur-niture and layout for an unobstructed inflow of air and light. Kanhai Gandhi, partner at an ar-chitecture and interior design firm, concludes, "Go in for metals as they are easy to maintain and allergen-free fabrics that will prove to be beneficial over time. Most importantly, get rid of the excess junk in the house
